EU support in Syria

Nearly €37 billion

have been allocated by the EU and its Member States since 2011, for the Syria crisis response. This includes almost €2.55 billion in EU assistance inside Syria.

The fall of the Assad regime offers a unique opportunity for the Syrian people, both inside Syria and in the host countries, to reunite, stabilise and rebuild their country.

Today, the EU is committed to supporting an inclusive, Syrian-led political process and the country's stabilisation, inter alia by scaling up efforts to assist in Syria's socio-economic recovery and reconstruction .

Further priorities will include maximizing the role of the civil society in driving an inclusive transition as well as creating the conditions for the voluntary, safe and dignified return of Syrian refugees.



€1.758 billion

in Humanitarian assistance

The EU provides lifesaving humanitarian aid inside Syria only via UN agencies, NGOs and international organisations to support:

Emergency health services, including trauma, maternal and child healthcare, sexual and reproductive health, and Mental Health and Psycho-Social Support (MHPSS).

Food assistance and security.

Support for livelihood opportunities, including multipurpose cash assistance.

Access to safe drinking water and sanitation services.

Emergency shelter and winterisation support.

Protection programmes, including individual case management, child protection, prevention and response to gender-based violence, as well as protection monitoring.

Education in emergencies.
