

EU support in Türkiye

Nearly **€11 billion**

of EU assistance in Türkiye since 2011 has enabled:



Nearly 1.6 million refugees to receive cash transfers for their basic needs.



Around 40.7 million primary health care consultations for refugees since 2016.



The mobilization of 3,700 healthcare staff and the upgrading of 603 healthcare facilities.



Close to 1 million refugees to rely onto protection services.



Approximately 834,000 refugee children to access formal education, with 176 new schools built.



€7 billion in Development assistance

The EU assistance provides support to both refugees and host communities in the following areas:

Basic needs: support for over 1.6 million refugees through the Social Safety Net for Refugees in Türkiye (SSN) programme, enabling them to live with dignity.

Education: funding for teaching salaries, school transport, construction and supplies, along with support for approximately 834 000 children through the Conditional Cash Transfer for Education (CCTE) and the PIKTES programmes.

Healthcare: support for medical staff salaries, the construction and equipping of migrant health centres, consultations and the construction of hospitals and clinics.

Socio-economic support: creation of jobs, vocational training, skills development and entrepreneurship opportunities.

Municipal infrastructure: construction of water supply, sanitation and solid waste management facilities, as well as recreational services and facilities.

Migration management: enhancement to the management, reception and hosting conditions for migrants.

€3.5 billion in Humanitarian assistance

EU humanitarian aid addresses the most urgent needs of refugees, including those affected by the 2023 earthquake, and host communities through:

Protection: support for refugee registration and the protection of vulnerable groups, including women, children, and other at-risk populations.

Education: assistance for out-of-school children in the most vulnerable communities.

Health: focus on physical rehabilitation, including providing prosthetics for individuals who have lost limbs.

Basic needs in the earthquake-affected areas: access to shelter, water, and sanitation facilities.
